Dear Friends,

The early Christians told stories about Jesus long before they wrote them down. They told what he said and did. But most of all, they told the terrible things that happened to him, his suffering, betrayal, and death on the cross.

The story of Jesus’ suffering and death takes up the majority of space in the Gospels. But why is that? Why would the Gospels not emphasize the triumphant parts of Jesus’ life, the happy times, the miracles, and the small victories?

The early Christians could focus on the insults, rejection, and pain that Jesus suffered and the failures of the disciples because they knew the ending: they knew the resurrected life.

So, if God can take something this ugly, painful, and senseless and transform it into something life-giving and meaningful, then God can take the worst part of me, the worst things that have been done to me, and he can transform them into something beautiful:

“Something beautiful, something good
All my confusion He understood
All I had to offer Him was brokenness and strife
But he made something beautiful of my life.”

In God’s hands, nothing is beyond repair, beyond transformation. That’s the Easter promise we receive. And this hope in Jesus’ promise makes us an Easter people. We will celebrate the promise of the resurrected life on **Easter Sunday, April 4** with communion. No adult education classes are held that day.

On Sunday, April 11, our worship team and Pastor Annemarie will be on break, so there is no in-person worship; instead, we will post on our church’s facebook page a video by our Synod worship team.

And on **Sunday, April 18**, we will kick off at 11 a.m. a new adult education class on the Gospel of John.

Wishing you now a blessed Happy Easter season with resurrection power. And see you in church or online!

The sound and video system is operating correctly now. We are still learning how to refine the operations of the camera and sound. Thank you all for being present or online and giving us your input about your viewing experience.

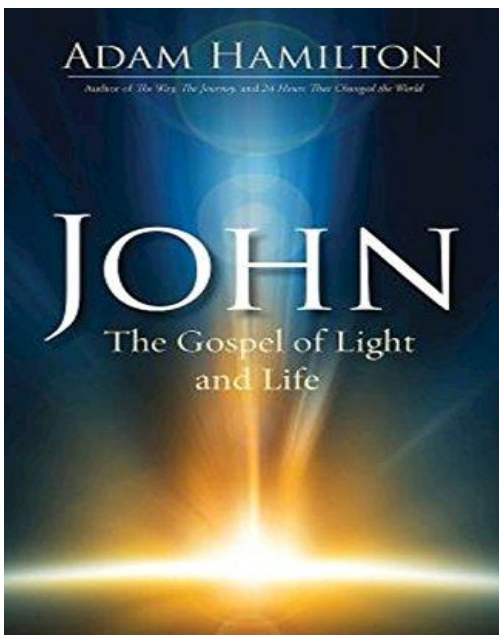
Please know also that we have four hearing devices available to amplify the sound. If you need a hearing device, please see me at 9:30 a.m. prior to the service, so we can set it up.

--NEW Book Study on the Gospel of John

Our new book study will kick off on **Sunday, April 18 at 11 a.m.** via Zoom. This seven-week study will be on the Gospel of John, which is quite different from the three other Gospels. In John, the focus is on who Jesus is rather than what he does. Jesus does not perform miracles but “signs.” And it is here that we find Jesus not teaching about the kingdom of God but about the believer’s relationship with him and the Father by the power of the Holy Spirit.

If you have been puzzled by John’s Gospel, this is the class for you. We will be using Adam Hamilton’s book John: The Gospel of Light and Life. Books are available at church for \$10 a copy. The class will be taught by Pastor Annemarie. You may pick up

your copy during church office hours on Mondays and Tuesdays from 1 to 5 p.m.

What is the 2021 Per Capita?

The Per capita is a set amount of money sometimes referred to as “apportionment” per member that congregations pay to the larger Presbyterian Church PC USA. It is like a community fund that holds Presbyterians together. Because we share in the benefit of the PC (USA)’s system of government, the expenses of that system are shared by everyone.

The amount or “membership dues” are set by each Presbytery individually. We as a Session only have input on the distribution amounts.

For 2021 the per capita rate per person is **\$35.23**. The recommended distribution of this amount is:
Presbytery of Lake Michigan 61% General Assembly PC USA 38% Synod of the Covenant 1%
At the February Session meeting the above distribution was reviewed and approved.

This is where we need your help: Our church needs to collect the **\$35.23** from each member individually. The amount is not included in the general pledge. You may pay your per capita by making a check out to the church with “Per Capita” on the memo line. We appreciate receiving this membership contribution at the beginning of the year as we have to make the payments to our Presbytery early on.

This month we meet **on Wednesday, April 14 at 6 p.m. (one week later than usual)** via facebook live for evening prayer. Go to Annemarie Kidder on facebook and wait for the little red notification dot in the bell icon to appear. Click on that icon, and you will be joined in a live broadcast. Evening prayer is a time of scripture reading, a brief meditation, and the lifting up of those we wish to pray for. Simply put your requests in the comment section while we are live. And invite others to join.

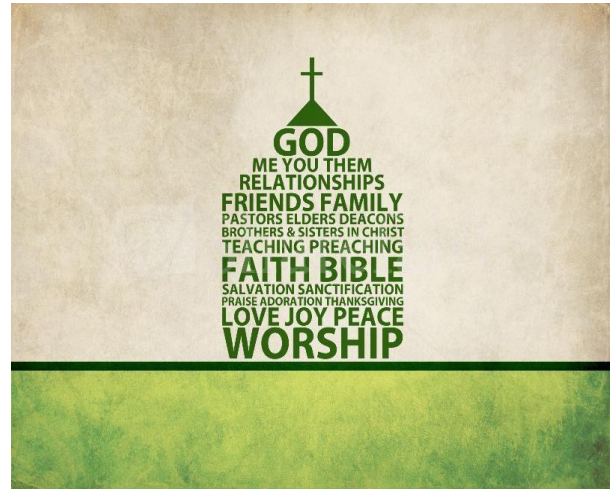
